

Meet Rachael Scott! She took over as Lawrenceburg Public Library District Genealogy/Local History Department manger in July. She previously worked as a youth services assistant at the Boone County Public Library Union Branch. But her interest in genealogy started at 7 or 8 years old.

Tell us a little about your family.

I've been happily married to Robert for more than 20 years, and we have two children. Both of our kids had the audacity to grow up and are currently away at college. I miss them terribly but I'm so stinking proud of what they are accomplishing. Robert LPLD Genealogy/Local History Department Manager Rachael and I have bounced around a little bit since we were married but we've been living in Hebron, Ky., for a little over five years.

Where are you from originally?

I was born in Utah, but moved cross-country for the first time before I was six-months old. My father worked for the government and HQ was in Maryland. We would live there for a little while and then we'd get shipped out again. I then married a man who works for a major airline so we've bounced around a little bit, too. I've lived in seven different states (a couple of them multiple times) and I've lived as far away as Japan.

When did you become interested in working at a library? Why?

I was a teenager the first time that I thought about working for the library. I've always loved books and I enjoy helping someone find a book that is the right fit for them. I love that libraries are safe places for everyone.

What do you love about libraries in general?

I love that libraries are open to everyone! I love to read but I could never afford to purchase all of the books that I'm interested in. I can, however, check them out from the library. Libraries offer so many other services for the community as well. Storytimes, programs, technology helps, classes, etc.

Do you have any memories of going to the library when you were a kid?

I have so many memories of going to the library when I was a kid! I've checked out hundreds of books during my lifetime. I went to school pre-Google, so I spent a lot of time both doing

research and finding the next fun read. When I lived in Japan, the library was within walking distance of my home. I was on a first name basis with the librarians because I was there so often.

How did you become interested in genealogy?

I have loved genealogy since I was a little girl. I loved to listen to my grandparents tell me stories about when they were young. I remember filling out a pedigree chart with my mother when I was only seven or eight years old. I love feeling connected to something so much bigger than me and finding out where my people are from. I feel like there is strength in that knowledge. My ancestors got through so many hard things and that makes me believe that I can get through hard things, too. I now collect pictures of my ancestors and I hang them all up on my "family walls." I have over 100 pictures and I love them!

Have you researched your family tree? Have you found anything interesting?

Yes, and yes. Some of my lines only go back 150 years or so but others go back to the 1500s. My 7th great-grandfather was John Hart, a delegate from New Jersey who signed the Declaration of Independence. I also have a few ancestors who came over on the Mayflower. FamilySearch has a really fun feature called Relative Finder. It can show you how you are (usually distantly) related to different artists, politicians, writers, and even royalty! King Charles is my 11th cousin once removed. I wonder if I'll be invited to the coronation?

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













What are some basic tools and suggestions you give someone just starting to research their family history?

Start with what you know - information about yourself and your parents. Talk to other family members, especially those who are older than you, and record what they know. Then feel free to come by the library. We will help you get organized and figure out next steps. And it's all FREE!

What is something interesting you helped someone else find out about their family history?

A gentleman came by the genealogy room a few months ago. He was asking for some information about one of his ancestors. After a little bit of digging, we found out that his ancestor saved the lives of a couple of my ancestors! It was crazy to see how connected we all are.

Have you found anything that has surprised you about the history of Dearborn County?

I am fascinated by the tenacity of the citizens. I've been looking through photos from some of the floods that hit the area.

especially the flood in 1937. To be able to come back and rebuild after that is truly incredible. I've been reading through some life sketches that were written about veterans and those stories get to me every single time. And I love the ties to the Underground Railroad.

Why is preserving history important?

We are who we are because of who we've been. People who have gone before were real. They deserve to be remembered and their lives should be honored. Being a part of preserving that history is an honor and a responsibility that I take seriously because people matter. Lives matter. Stories matter.

What do you want people to know about the Genealogy and Local History Department at the LPLD?

Everyone who works in the department is very passionate about the work that we get to do. We love the research and are not intimidated by genealogical brick walls. Everyone is welcome. We will do everything that we can to help people connect to their past.


