New library director ready to keep building on community partnerships

If you like Joey Votto, Jake Moore is ready for an in-depth discussion.

Actually, if you want to talk baseball in general you might get lost in conversation for hours.

“I am the guy with the notebook at the games keeping track of things going on,” said Moore.

But let’s make this clear, although he loves watching and rooting for the Reds, the Boston Red Sox is the team closest to his heart.

His dad, who died when he was young, loved the Red Sox, though he was never able to figure out why.

“I latched on to that,” said Moore.

As the new director of the Lawrenceburg Public Library District, Moore is looking forward to being a part of the community and having many discussions on a wide variety of subjects.

“Lawrenceburg seems like a great city that has a vibe where everybody wants to push the city forward,” said Moore, who grew up in Northern Indiana in the city of Nappanee, located about a half hour south of

South Bend. After graduating high school, he did landscaping for the business of a family friend. When they ran out of things for him to do, they encouraged him to contact the director of the local library for a job. “When I walked in ... she had no idea who I was,” laughed Moore. But he did get a job and ended

up learning about many aspects of the library from reference to circulation. “I just really enjoyed the work ... I like public service and helping the community at large,” said Moore. While attending Indiana University South Bend, studying education, he worked at the St. Joseph County Public Library in South Bend.

He left for a little while to work in the education field, but ultimately his life path returned him to a library career. Eventually he earned a masters in library science through Indiana University Purdue University, Indianapolis. “I never looked back at that point,” said Moore.



He moved to the Tri-State area to be closer to his wife's family. His wife, Amy, is originally from Delhi, Ohio. They currently live in Newport, Ky., with their two daughters Imogen, 4, and Elliott, 2, who will be 3 in August.

He worked for the Boone County Public Library for 10 years, most recently as the branch manager of the Florence branch. He also spent time as the youth services librarian and youth services manager.

Becoming a library district director seemed like the next step, so he applied for the LPLD job. He also had a tie to the area, camping in the past on property in Friendship owned by family friends, the late Dale and Ruth Nowlin of Greendale.

The LPLD Board of Trustees have been very supportive and

the library district employees have all been great, said Moore.

"That's a great situation to go into," he said.

His vision for the library district is for the big picture, it already functions very well, he said.

He hopes to push boundaries into the digital realm, something many libraries did during pandemic lockdown but started to pull back from when COVID numbers started improving, said Moore.

He hopes more programs will be held in-person and virtually, giving people who are busy or unable to come to the library a chance to attend, he said.

"You can really expand who your audience can be," said Moore.

He said he also loves when staff and patrons can share their expertise, hobbies and

passions. He looks forward to building even more community partnerships, he said.

In addition to baseball, Moore's interests include old movies, focusing currently on French New Wave. A couple overall movie favorites are *Dr. Strangelove* and *The Night of the Hunter*.

Favorite authors include Chuck Palahniuk, Kurt Vonnegut and John Steinbeck.

Seems like a man with a quiet, old soul right? In many ways that is true. (Just ask about his record collection that is starting to get a little bit out of control.)

But what kind of story would this be if it did not have some type of twist at the end? A twist that comes in the colors of orange and blue.

Look closely if you ever attend a FC Cincinnati soccer game, or

view photos or video from a home match. You just might see Moore in the Bailey, the club's home supporters section.

He used to be one of the people yelling his support, but that was too tough on his voice. Now he is one of the fans who occasionally drums as part of The Knights of the Bailey.

He has been a fan of the team since he received free tickets to one of the games, he said.

Just make sure you look fast. Although his tenure as the LPLD director is just getting started, his "retirement" as one of the drummers may be imminent.

The drumming can be time consuming, taking time away from his family, especially when he comes home exhausted from the day, he said, adding his wife has been very supportive and understanding.




That is in addition to our established book clubs, Book Chat, Historical Book Club and Books for Dessert.


New adults

ber 9 by Colleen Hoover, and *Red, White and Royal Blue* by Casey McQuiston.



Coffee Lovers
